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What is a Cystogram X-ray?

It is an examination of the bladder. It shows what it looks like, and how it is working.

The x-ray camera directs a beam through the part of your body that is being examined.

Are there any risks involved?

During your procedure you will receive a dose of ionising radiation to help us form images of your body and this will provide your doctor with detailed information. The radiation dose is always kept as low as possible. The actual dose you receive will vary depending on the type of procedure you are having, but your doctor has considered this and feels that this is the best procedure for you to have to help diagnose or treat your condition.

We are all at risk of developing cancer in our lifetime and the added risk from undergoing your procedure is small and is outweighed because of the benefits it provides and every procedure that you have in Radiology has been assessed to ensure that the benefit outweighs the risk. Do I have to have this examination?

The doctor in the clinic has requested this x- ray. It is considered the most effective way of helping with diagnosis.



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Before:

You may eat and drink normally

- You may take your usual medication

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During:

- You will be asked to change into a hospital gown on arrival.
- We need to start with an empty bladder, so you will be shown to a toilet to empty your bladder.
- When you come back to the x-ray room, the nurse will explain this procedure to you.
- To begin with, a catheter will be passed into your bladder through its natural urinary opening.
- A special fluid is passed through the catheter so that it fills your bladder. This fluid will show up your bladder more clearly on the images.
- When your bladder is full, the doctor will take x-rays.
- Whilst your bladder is still full, the couch will be tilted so that you are in a standing position.
- You will then be asked to empty your bladder and the examination is complete.



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After:

- There should be no after effects. You may drive yourself home, or return to work immediately.
- The Radiologist will examine your images and make a report. This will be sent to your Consultant.
