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## What is an Ultrasound scan?

For this scan we use high frequency sound waves. Humans are unable to hear them, but the scanning machine uses them to produce scan images.

## Are there any risks involved?

Complications are rare. However, infection or bleeding could be experienced in exceptional circumstances. Our strict guidelines in performing this procedure ensure that this risk is reduced to a minimum.

## Do I have to have this scan?

The doctor has requested this scan for you. It is the easiest way to gain the information needed to diagnose your problem.

## Check these instructions carefully:

If you take **Warfarin** or **Clopidogrel** tablets you must ring us. The number for all queries or concerns is:

## Note:

**It is important that you have a blood test before this procedure as we will need the results before we start. This can be done up to 5 days before the biopsy date. You can also have them done on the day of your procedure however; you must have your blood taken at least 1.5 hours before your appointment time for results to be available.**



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- The form for the blood test is enclosed.
- Please attend the Blood Test Department to have the test as soon as possible which is located on the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor and they are open between 8.30am – 4.00pm Monday to Friday.

## **What should I do on the day of the scan?**

- Do not eat anything for ..... hours before your appointment time, you can however drink clear fluids this includes water, black tea/coffee or squash up to 2 hours before appointment.
- Please bring a small overnight bag with you

## **What does it involve?**

- The procedure is very quick and easy – it will take approximately 30 minutes
- You will have an injection of local anaesthetic to numb the area, and then a very fine needle is inserted so that a sample of tissue can be taken. This may have to be repeated several times to obtain the correct amount.

## **What happens after?**

- Be prepared to stay in our recovery bay for ..... hours afterwards so that we can make sure you are well enough to go home.
- Be aware that on very rare occasions it may be necessary for you to stay in hospital overnight at home.
- You should not drive yourself home.



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- A friend or relative should accompany you to the hospital and be able to stay with you overnight.

As a doctor from the hospital sent you, you will receive a letter or follow-up appointment to discuss the results.
