



Guidelines following Diathermy Loop Excision / Large Loop Excision of Transformation Zone / Local Ablative Therapy / Cervical Cautery (LLETZ)

We hope that your stay in our Day Surgery Unit has been comfortable and to your satisfaction. We hope that you have a speedy recovery and that the following instructions will be of help.

LLETZ involves removing abnormal cervical cells using a thin wire loop that's heated with an electric current, it is usually done under local anaesthetic (awake) and does not normally require a hospital stay.

Aftercare – you can often go home to rest soon after the treatment. Most people feel well enough to resume normal activities the following day. It is normal to have a slight loss from the vagina, this should stop after a week but may continue for up to four weeks. Please do not use tampons or menstrual cups for four weeks post procedure.

You can have your usual bath or shower.

Do not undertake strenuous exercise including swimming for at least two weeks or until there is no further discharge.

Avoid having sex for four weeks.

If you experience heavy or continuous bleeding, persistent stomach aches or foul smelling discharge please contact your General Practitioner (GP).

Follow Up - We will tell you about any follow up before you leave. If you need an outpatient appointment we will request one for you and the date and time will be sent to you by post.

Stockings - If you have been given support stockings to wear it is important that you continue to wear them, day and night, until you are fully mobile (at least 24-48 hours). The stockings should be removed for a short time daily to wash the feet and legs. You may also hand wash the stockings but do not dry them by direct heat (radiator or tumble dryer).



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Pain Relief – Mild to moderate cramping similar to period pain is normal. This usually passes within a few hours and responds well to over the counter pain relief.

Instructions for patients who have had a general anaesthetic

Anaesthetic drugs remain in the body for 24 hours and gradually wear off over this time.

During the 24 hours following your anaesthetic, you are under the influence of drugs and it is important to follow these instructions:

- Do not drive a car or any other vehicle, including a bicycle.
- Do not operate machinery or appliances such as cookers or kettles.
- Do not drink any alcohol.
- Do not lock the bathroom or toilet door or make yourself inaccessible to the person looking after you.
- Drink plenty of fluids and eat a light diet, avoiding heavy or greasy foods.
- Take things easy for the day after your operation and do not work with machinery or take strenuous exercise.
- Do not make important decisions or sign important documents for 24 hours after your anaesthetic.

Some people take longer to recover from the effects of an anaesthetic so these guidelines may continue to be followed for up to 48 hours, if necessary.
